"Remíníscence"







As I look back, this act of getting one's hair scissored has, is and will remain a laughable act of social compliance!





I attended with a fresh perspective, having learnt something new about myself. A great way to spend a couple of hours every Saturday evening!



During this journey of almost a month, there was one profound thing that Sindhu and I learnt...


The world is full of people saying, never look back, it is all in the past and will never come back.
